Prepositions



Sometimes when looking for adjectives and adverbs, the answers to the questions Which?, How?, Why?, When?, and Where? are answered with a group of words instead of single words. When this happens, the group of words acts as an **adjective phrase** if it answers Which?, and an **adverb phrase** if it answers the other questions, and the first word in the phrase is called a **preposition**.

Example: The man in the blue suit walked up the street.

What are the nouns? They are "man", "suit" and "street".
Which man? The man <u>in the blue suit</u>. This is an adjective phrase.
The first word is <u>in</u>. This is a preposition.
Did the man do anything? Yes!
What did the man do? He walked.
Where did he walk? <u>Up the street</u>. This is an adverb phrase.
The first word is <u>up</u>. This is a preposition.

There can be more than one phrase to describe a noun or a verb. It is a good idea to check phrases to make sure there is only one noun. This noun should be the last word in the phrase.

Example: A car on the street with worn tires skidded to a stop at the corner.

What are the nouns? They are "car", "street", "tires", "stop" and "corner".

Which car? The car <u>on the street</u>. The car <u>with worn tires</u>. There are both adjective phrases.

The first words are <u>on</u> and <u>with</u>. They are prepositions.

Did the man do anything? Yes!

What did the car do? It skidded.

How did it skid? <u>To a stop</u>. This is an adverb phrase.

Where did it skid? <u>At the corner</u>. This is also an adverb phrase.

The first words are <u>to</u> and <u>at</u>. They are prepositions.

EXERCISES:

A. Put brackets (around the adjective and adverb phrases) in the sentences. <u>Underline</u> the preposition in each phrase.

Example: The man (in the brown jacket) walked slowly (down the street.)

- 1) Five boys from this college are running in the race.
- 2) A little dog crawled under the gate and ran into the empty house.
- 3) The racing car went off the road, through a fence and into a farmer's field.
- 4) Twenty members of the team won medals at the games.
- 5) Among the trees in the jungle there are monkeys walking along the branches.
- 6) A new sign with large print was placed over the door at the entrance to the office.
- 7) After the meeting the waiters were given fifteen minutes of break time.

SOLUTIONS

- A. 1) (<u>from</u> this college), (<u>in</u> the race) 2) (<u>under</u> the gate), (<u>into</u> the empty house)
 - 3) (off the road), (through a fence), (into a farmer's field)
 - 4) (of the team), (at the games)
 - 5) (<u>Among the trees</u>), (<u>in</u> the jungle), (<u>along</u> the branches)
 - 6) (<u>with</u> large print), (<u>over</u> the door), (<u>at</u> the entrance), (<u>to</u> the office)
 - 7) (<u>After</u> the meeting), (<u>of</u> break time)
