



MLA Citation Style, 9th ed.

This guide explains the basic rules of MLA citation and provides examples for commonly used resources. For more detailed information, consult the MLA Handbook (Broadway Library PE 1478 M57 2021) or one of the other MLA guides on the Library website.

The MLA format consists of two parts:

1. **In-text citations**
2. **Works Cited (a bibliography at the end of your paper)**

In-Text Citations (in the body of your paper)

Provide the author's **last name** and the **page number** in parentheses immediately following a quotation or a paraphrase from a source.

1 Author

(Baldwin 132).

In "Sonny's Blues", Baldwin describes ... (132).

2 Authors

(Butler and Hark 206-07).

Butler and Hark present the basic tenets of ... (206-07).

3 or More Authors

(Hines et al. 11).

Hines et al. explore the relationship between ... (11).

*For 3 or more authors, only include the first authors last name followed by et al. for all other authors.

Indigenous Elders and Knowledge Keepers

(Cardinal 112).

The nature of the place was... (Cardinal 112).

Corporate Author

(Modern Language Association of America 18).

* Note the full name of the corporate author

No Author – use shortened title

("Courage" 126)

* When there is no author, use a shortened title. Article and webpage titles are in quotation marks, books and websites are in italics

AI (CoPilot, ChatGPT, etc.) – use shortened prompt

("Women rights")

* MLA states that AI tools do not have authors. Instead, use a shortened version of the prompt you used for your search) and put it in quotation marks and sentence case.

No Page Number

"What is it about us human beings that we can't let go of lost things?" asks the author (Silko, par. 2).

*When no page number is provided, use a paragraph or section number. If none is available, omit.

Indirect Source

In analyzing "what holds marriage together," Jan Trost proposes that most of the standard bonds have declined (qtd. in Beaujot 110).

An indirect source is when you quote a source that is cited or quoted in the source you are using. Use "qtd. in" to indicate the source you consulted.

Poem

In sonnet 73, Shakespeare compares the branches of trees in late autumn to "[b]are ruined choirs, where late the sweet birds sang" (line 4).

* Provide the line numbers. If these are not provided, note the page number.

Play

Hamlet seems resolute at first when he asserts, "Haste me to know't, that I, with wings as swift / As meditation.... / May sweep to my revenge" (1.5.35-37).

* Cite the act, scene, and lines, separating the numbers with periods. The example above refers to act 1, scene 5, lines 35-37 of Shakespeare's play *Hamlet*.

Works Cited list (at the end of your paper)

Core Elements for MLA Citations – include only those which apply:

The MLA format is based on a list of 9 core elements, which are given in a specific order (see table).

To write a citation, include all core elements that are available and omit those that are not.

Use the punctuation after each element as outlined in the table.

Citations are double-spaced.

The first line begins at the left margin and all subsequent lines use a hanging indent.

Publication date: provide the most specific date available in the format of day-month-year.

Location - Which Link?

Use the DOI and precede it with <https://doi.org/>.

If there is no DOI, use the permanent link as it is noted on the resource.

When there is no DOI or permanent link, use the URL and remove the <https://>.

Authors, Books & eBooks

Core Elements for Books: Author. *Title of source*. Other Contributors, Version, Number, Publisher, Publication Date, Page number range (for chapters). *Database*, DOI/Permanent link/URL.

One Author

Vermette, Katherena. *The Circle*. Hamish Hamilton, 2023.

*The author's name is reversed; the title is in italics.

Two Authors

Butler, Judith, and Frédéric Worms. *The Livable and the Unlivable*. Fordham UP, 2023. *EBSCOhost*, research.ebsco.com/linkprocessor/plink?id=708f2508-d88d-3b2b-ac59-cc928043382a.

*First author's name is reversed; the second author's name is not. Use the abbreviation UP for University Press.

*For e-books, note the database in italics and give the link as it is provided.

Three or More Authors

*Only list the first author's name in reverse order; for all other authors note as "et al."

*For e-books, note the database in italics and give the link as it is provided.

Editor(s) as Author

Bennett, Donna and Russell Brown, editors. *An Anthology of Canadian Literature in English*. 4th ed.,
Oxford UP, 2019.

* add editor or editors after the name(s)

Edition of a Book

Mays, Kelly J., editor. *The Norton Introduction to Literature*. Shorter 14th ed., W.W. Norton & Company,
2022.

*The edition information is placed before the publisher and is abbreviated.

Indigenous Elders and Knowledge Keepers

Lekeyten, Elder, Kwantlen First Nation. *Community Justice*. Personal communication, 4 April 2019.
Shared on the traditional unceded territory of the Kwantlen, Musqueam, Katzie, Semiahmoo,
Tsawwassen, Qayqayt and Kwikwetlem Peoples.

*Core elements: Last name, First names, Elder, Nation/Community. Topic/subject of communication if applicable.
Personal communication, Day Month Year. Territorial Acknowledgement of where the information was
shared/collected.

Corporate Author or Organization

MLA Handbook. The Modern Language Association of America, 2021. *EBSCOhost*,
research.ebsco.com/linkprocessor/plink?id=2674803f-987c-3dca-91c8-bc3e6584f930.

* Note the corporate author or organization's name in full.

* When the corporate author and the publisher are the same, note the title first and list the corporate author as the publisher.

Chapter or Article from an Edited Book

Stapleton, Patricia A. "Suicide as Apocalypse in *The Handmaid's Tale*." *Margaret Atwood's Apocalypses*, edited by Karma Waltonen, Cambridge Scholars Publishing, 2015, pp. 27-39. *EBSCOhost*, research.ebsco.com/linkprocessor/plink?id=d3af9527-21bc-3348-90c8-0c22a7f80885.

* Note the author of the chapter and place the title of the chapter in quotation marks. The title of the book is in italics and followed by the editor's name. Add the page numbers for the chapter after the date. The database is in italics and followed by the link.

Online Book (public domain)

Fitzgerald, F. Scott. *The Great Gatsby*. *Project Gutenberg*, 18 Oct. 2024, www.gutenberg.org/ebooks/64317.

* Cite a Project Gutenberg e-book noting Project Gutenberg as the publisher, the publication/updated date, & URL.

Articles from Journals, Magazines & Newspapers

Core elements to include in your citation for a journal, magazine, or newspaper article:

Author. "Title of Article." *Title of Journal*, vol., no., Date, Pages. *Database*, DOI/Permanent link/URL.

* **Date:** provide the most specific date on the source in the format of day-month-year. Use lowercase for seasons (fall, etc.)

* **Location link:** Use the DOI and proceed it with <https://doi.org/>. If there is no DOI, use the permanent link as it is noted on the resource. When there is no DOI or permanent link, use the URL and remove the <https://>.

Article in a Scholarly Journal

* The article title is in quotation marks; journal title in italics

* Note the name of the database in italics and provide the link

Internet

* Do not include Google or Google Scholar as a database (they are search engines)

* The date you accessed the resource is only required when there is no date, however, it is recommended

Article in a Magazine / Newspaper / News Website

* Note the name of the database in italics and provide the link

AI Generated Information

AI – ChaptGPT, Co-Pilot, etc

"How does climate change create extreme weather events in Canada with citations for three sources" prompt. *ChatGPT*, 6 Nov. 2023 version, OpenAI, 12 Feb. 2025, chat.openai.com/chat.

- Do not use the author field. MLA does not consider OpenAI an author.
- Title: Your prompt (question) in quotations
- Title of Container - *ChatGPT*
- Version: find and include the date of the version you are using. E.g. GPT-4-Turbo is "6 Nov. 2023 version"
- Publisher: OpenAI
- Date: the date the content was created. E.g. 12 Feb. 2025
- URL for ChatGPT - chat.openai.com/chat

General Reference Works (Encyclopedia, Handbook, etc.)

Electronic Encyclopedia

- * Note the author of the encyclopedia article/entry. If there is no author, begin with the title of the article/entry
- * Place the title of the encyclopedia article in quotation marks, and the title of the encyclopedia in italics
- * Do not provide the publisher information

Websites

Core Elements:

Author. "Title of web page/section/article." *Title of Overall Website*, Other contributors, Version or Edition, Number, Publisher, Full Date, URL (remove https://).

Webpage

* Omit http:// or https:// from the URL

* Include the date accessed at the end of your citation, e.g., Accessed 20 Feb. 2025.

Webpage - Group Author

* When the page is authored and published by the same corporation/group/organization, begin your citation with the title of web page/section/article. If the author and publisher are different, include the author's name at the beginning.

Webpage – No Author

"Margaret Atwood." *Poetry Foundation*, 2025, www.poetryfoundation.org/poets/margaret-atwood. Accessed 20 Feb. 2025.

*If there's no individual author, begin the citation with "Title of web page/section/article."

* Include the date accessed at the end of your citation, e.g., Accessed 20 Feb. 2025.

Entire Website – No Author

Videos, TV, Films & Podcasts

Video from the Internet (YouTube, TED, etc.)

List films by their title. Include the name of the director, and if relevant, list performer names, then the film studio or distributor, and the release year. List the platform and provide the link (removing https://)

Social Media

Core Elements:

Author [@handle]. "Text from the post. If no text, provide a description." *Title of website*, Date posted, URL. Accessed date.

*Use the name on the account as the author. However, if an author's online handle differs from the author's account name, add the handle in square brackets after the name.

*If you can't determine the date posted, list the copyright date of the page, and if there's no copyright date, provide the date you accessed the post.
